# Sustainable sites challenge

#### Main learning points



- There are lots of ways to be sustainable
- Sustainability is relevant to historic sites
- Organisations and individuals have a role to play in being more sustainable

#### Resources required



- Image of a historic site and ticket office/visitor centre, either printed at A3 size or projected onto a smartboard (p5-6)
- Your own objects or printed images of objects (p7-11) that represent different aspects of sustainability
- **Labels** (p12)
- Sticky notes, paper and pens or smartboard and pens
- Instruction sheet (p13)
- Explanation sheet (p14-15)

#### Introduction: What is sustainability?



Ask participants to describe what sustainability means.

Explain that it is about meeting our needs without having a negative impact on the needs of people in the future. This means we need to think about:

- the choices we make
- how we live
- what we buy
- how things are made

Historic Environment Scotland (HES) are trying to manage and look after their properties in a more sustainable wav.

Visitors also need to behave/visit in a more sustainable way.

Everyone needs to do their part to look after the historic environment (and the planet!) now and for the future.

#### **Activity**



- Set out on a table:
  - your objects (or **images of objects**)
  - the labels
  - sticky notes/small pieces of paper

  - large printed image of the historic site (or use image on Smartboard)
- Provide participants with the **instruction sheet** to read first.
- Ask participants to match the object/image with the sustainability theme label. Check their answers.
- Participants choose three objects/images to discuss and come up with ideas for:
  - what **visitors** could do to be more sustainable
  - how **HES** could make this more sustainable.
- Participants write their suggestions on the sticky notes/paper and put them on the printed image of the site (or write on the Smartboard).
- After they have written up their ideas, hand out the **explanation sheet** to learn about the ways organisations and individuals can be more sustainable.
- Participants share their ideas with other groups.

Take a photo of participants' ideas and send it to **#LearningWithHES** or share it locally to make a difference.

#### Alternative/extension activity:

- Discuss with participants what sustainability means and examples of ways to be sustainable.
- Ask participants to do some online research to find historic sites or visitor centres that are trying to find ways to be more sustainable.
- Provide participants with modelling clay, paper and pens or LEGO and challenge them to plan and design (draw, sculpt or build) a visitor centre with examples of what it could have in place to make it sustainable e.a.
  - wildflowers
  - recycle bins
  - solar panels
  - bike racks.









# Sustainability theme labels

#### Gifts/souvenirs The gifts in our shops are made in different **Biodiversity** countries We need to manage the natural environment around our historic sites Waste Litter is produced by HES, its staff and visitors to historic sites **Packaging** Visitors buy things during a visit and take them away **Energy loss** Our historic sites are old: only some have roofs **Paper** We might offer visitors a quiz to use during their visit **Travel** Visitors use different types of transport to Food and drink get to historic sites Our shops can have fridges selling bottled drinks and coffee machines Visitors Historic sites can get a few visitors or lots **Energy use** of visitors Some historic sites need to use electricity for lights, tills, heat etc

### **Activity instructions:** Sustainable sites

Choose three of the objects or photos and match them with their correct label to find out how they link to sustainability.



- For each object, have a discussion in your group and decide:
  - What could HES do to be more sustainable?
  - What could visitors do to be more sustainable?
- Write down your suggestions on the sticky notes/ pieces of paper. Put them on the large image of the historic site or draw them on the smartboard.



# Activity explanation: **Sustainable sites**

Here are some ways we could think about being more sustainable:

Object/image	What HES can do	What visitors can do
Travel	<ul> <li>Install bike racks to encourage people to cycle to sites</li> </ul>	<ul><li>Car share to get to a site to cut down on emissions</li><li>Get the train</li></ul>
Energy Use	<ul> <li>Switch to energy efficient light bulbs</li> <li>Install timers which control when lights come on to cut down on energy use</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Only use hand driers for time needed</li> <li>Remember to switch taps off</li> </ul>
Energy Loss	<ul> <li>Insulate the roofs of its buildings to keep heat from escaping</li> </ul>	Close doors behind them to prevent heat escaping and reduce the energy needed to heat a room or space
Biodiversity	<ul> <li>Leave grass to grow longer to support wildlife</li> <li>Plant bee-friendly flowers</li> </ul>	Respect wildlife     habitats and areas
Visitors	Limit the number of visitors at a time	Behave responsibly:     follow paths, do not     climb on walls
Gifts/souvenirs	<ul> <li>Source items that are more sustainably made: recycled materials, less plastic</li> <li>Source shop stock from local suppliers</li> </ul>	Choose to buy things made from recycled materials or made locally

Packaging	Replace plastic bags with paper bags	Bring their own reusable bags
Waste	Install recycling bins	• Take home their rubbish
Food and drink	Offer tap water for free	Bring their own reusable water bottles
